Tower Hamlets/ London funding

- <u>City Bridge Trust</u> (no set maximium): Funding climate action in London, and decarbonising charities' operations and spaces, as well as other funding streams. Applications accepted on a rolling basis.
- <u>East London Community Foundation:</u> No relevant funding at the moment so we recommend that you monitor this page and sign up to their newsletter to hear about any relevant funding.
- Greater London Authority Environment and Climate Change:
 Opportunities to get involved in GLA programmes and to hear about any future funding.

Specific opportunities in 2023

- <u>Friends Provident Foundation:</u> Offer project and core funding for organisations trying to change the way our economy works. For larger grants there is a rolling application process with <u>4 deadlines over the year.</u>
 For <u>small grants</u> (up to £10,000), information will be available in February 2023.
- <u>Garfield Western</u> (regular grants up to £100,000 and large grants £100,000+): Support a wide range of charities that make a positive difference, working in different sectors in the UK. These include welfare, youth, community, environment, education, health, arts, heritage and faith. Rolling application process.
- The Happiness Fund (max. £2,500): For grassroots, neighbourhood-based community projects that build happy, strong, resilient communities across the UK. Individuals and small, not-for-profit businesses can apply for funding to set up new groups and activities that improve mental health and wellbeing, inclusion, and learning and skills development in local communities. Applications will re-open from April 2023.

- Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust Grassroots Movement Fund: For grassroots social movements on the frontlines of social and environmental injustice, and who are striving for transformative change. The next funding round will open again later in 2023.
- <u>Lush Charity Pot</u> (£100 to £10,000): For groups working in the areas of animal protection, environment or Human Rights (incl. social justice, peace & equality). Applications are accepted at any time.
- <u>National Lottery Grants for Heritage</u> (£3,000 to £10,000): For not-for-profit
 organisations or private owners looking to connect people and
 communities to heritage in the UK. Heritage can include nature, designed
 landscapes, landscapes and the countryside and cultural traditions. Rolling
 deadline. <u>Larger grants</u> also available.
- The NatureSave Trust (£500 to £2,500) For community projects who are running initiatives to tackle pollution and single use plastic.
- <u>Ninevah Charitable Trust</u> (no set maximum): Supports a broad range of UK-based projects and activities of benefit to the general public, with an emphasis on promoting a better understanding of the countryside. Rolling deadline with funding decisions made each quarter.
- Shroder Charitable Trust (up to £5,000): Towards core and project costs to charities registered in the UK for work under the following categories: Arts, Culture and Heritage, Education, Training and Employment, Environment and Conservation, Health and Wellbeing and Strengthening Communities. a rolling programme and therefore does not set fixed deadlines.
 Organisations can apply at any time. Decisions on applications are made twice a year.
- The Vegan Society (no maximum grant, but a typical award is no more than £1,000): To support projects which will encourage non-vegans to go vegan and stay vegan. Deadlines for applications throughout the year are 31 December, 31 March, 30 June, 30 September.
- <u>Veolia Environmental Trust</u> (£10,000 £75,000 TBC): For environmental or community-based projects located within five miles of a Veolia Environmental Services facility, although they are currently reviewing their criteria. Check if you organisation is eligible through the <u>postcode checker</u>. <u>Application rounds</u> open on 23 May, 31 August and 30 November 2023.

Other funders who may have relevant funding

- Artemis Charitable Foundation Prioritise organisations that are doing something different and projects that are sustainable and can be scaled up/replicated. Funding current closed so check for updates.
- <u>Badur Foundation</u> Supports local projects that tackle key environmental challenges in order to create a more sustainable future. <u>Contact them</u> to be invited to apply.
- <u>Edge Fund</u> Support efforts to achieve social, economic and environmental justice, and to end imbalances of wealth and power. Next funding round opening in Spring 2023.
- The JJ Charitable Trust Projects supporting social and cultural change towards more sustainable lifestyles – creative approaches that visualise a sustainable future in positive ways, innovative economic models that support sustainable lifestyles, and the role of the broadcast media in communicating about climate change and sustainability.
- Necessity
- <u>Network for Social Change</u> Projects that promote social change (broadly defined) and tend to favour projects which are innovative, highly leveraged, and/or difficult to fund (a category which may include core funding for an organisation). We like addressing the root causes of a problem, not the symptoms. Submit a project idea for to the <u>Project Noteboard</u> to be invited to apply.
- Oak Foundation Oak Foundation commits its resources to address issues
 of global, social, and environmental concern, particularly those that have a
 major impact on the lives of the disadvantaged. <u>Submit an enquiry</u> to be
 invited to apply.
- <u>Paul Hamlyn Foundation</u> Aims to support organisations responding to the climate emergency as one of its priorities.
- <u>Polden Puckham</u> Aim to contribute to the development of a just society based on a commitment to nonviolence and environmental sustainability.
- <u>Power to Change</u> Support community businesses. Find out about the current open programmes.

- <u>Samworth Foundation</u> Seek to fund organisations who are working to restore
 the health of the environment, as well as those who are addressing the
 systems and behaviours that have a negative impact on our planet.
 Applications by invitation only.
- <u>Social Investment Business's Recovery Loan Fund</u> (grants of between £25,000 and £200,000 Grants are for Black and minoritised ethnicity-led charities and social enterprises in England who have been impacted by the coronavirus pandemic.
